COMBO OF RESPIRATORY VIRUSES


- COVID

COVID-19 – PERCENT POSITIVITY BY SURVEILLANCE WEEK IN ONTARIO





INFLUENZA – PERCENT POSITIVITY BY SURVEILLANCE WEEK IN ONTARIO



LET'S NOT FORGET OUR LAYERS OF PROTECTION

- As we go into the holiday season, it is important that we still remember our layers of protections:
 - ✓Staying up-to-date with the recommended COVID-19 vaccine doses
 - √Getting the annual flu shot
 - √Staying home if ill
 - √Frequent hand hygiene
 - ✓ Limiting the number of social gathering







REMINDER TO AVOID THE THREE C'S

- The truth is the pandemic is not over
- Here's a reminder to be careful of the three C's to help us and people around us to stay safe:
 - > Crowded places
 - Close-contact setting especially where people have close range conversations (leaning to speak to each other)
 - > Confined and enclosed spaces
 - > Combination of the 3...







COMMUNAL DINNING/BUFFET

- Communal dining (including buffet and shared meal service) is permitted unless otherwise advised by the local PHU with the following public health measures in place:
- physical distancing and masking protocols
- Frequent hand hygiene is recommended for staff, residents, and visitors.
- We must ensure that residents who are experiencing signs and symptoms of COVID-19 do not participate in communal dining until the resident has tested negative for COVID-19, is no longer symptomatic and has been cleared from isolation.
- It cannot happen once outbreak is declared







GENERAL IPAC GUIDANCE ON DECORATIONS

- When decorations are being brought out from storage, it should be cleaned before being moved to patient area
- Decorations that are easily cleaned should be selected
- Decorations should be cleanable (not filled with dust/contaminants)
 even on display
- They are expected to be viewed not touched
- Visibly damaged, old, worn or torn decorations should be discarded







APPROPRIATE DECORATION PLACEMENT

- Ensure fire and safety regulations are followed
- Not to be placed on high-touched areas or regularly cleaned areas such as hand rails
- Not be in nursing station, treatment/procedure/ medication rooms as these areas must be accessible for cleaning and disinfection
- Should not interfere with regular house keeping
- Best in locations out of public reach







APPROPRIATE DECORATION PLACEMENT (CTD)

At the end of the season :

When decorations are being stored away, it should be cleaned and wiped with hospital grade disinfectant

perform hand hygiene before and after handling, while taking it down





COSTUMES

- Costumes should not interfere with care
- Flowing gowns may be worn in common places when not providing care
- Costumes must still allow appropriate PPE donning and doffing
- Should not interfere with hand hygiene
- Special character such as Santa Claus visiting homes must:
 - √Be screened
 - √Not enter isolation rooms (instead, can be done virtually)







FOOD SHARING

- Although respiratory virus are not food borne, sharing food is still
 considered as high risk because it's not possible to wear mask while
 eating and drinking, and also maintaining physical distancing.
- Hence there must be abundance of caution!!!







FOOD SHARING (CONT.)

- Hand hygiene must be performed before serving and sharing food
- Buffet style gathering should be in spacious places
- Should not be done if on enhanced monitoring or outbreak
- Kitchen should be restricted to staff only

- Keep it small
- Improve ventilation open windows / use large spaces
- Mask Up
- Make use of technology
- Stay up-to-date with COVID-19 vaccine doses and flu shot
